Bruno Pedro Chumpitazi, MD

I am an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine/Texas Children's Hospital in Houston and Director of the Neurogastroenterology and Motility Program at Texas Children's Hospital. I currently serve as the NASPGHAN Research Committee Chair. From a training standpoint: I'm a Wolverine through and through (University of Michigan undergrad); completed medical school (along with an MPH) at Tufts University School of Medicine; finished pediatrics residency at Children's Hospital of New York Presbyterian/Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons; and completed fellowship at Boston Children's Hospital/ Harvard Medical School.

From early on in pediatric gastroenterology training I was struck by how common certain disorders such as irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) were and the morbidity associated with them. Though there is a tremendous amount of exciting growth in the field, pediatric neurogastroenterology remains clinically and scientifically underserved. I have dedicated my academic career toward applying the most effective, cutting edge, and multi-disciplinary techniques to help children with gastrointestinal functional and motility disorders. My group's scientific research has focused on elucidating the interaction between fermentable carbohydrates and the gut microbiome to induce symptoms in children with IBS. Other research interests include meal-induced symptoms in children with functional dyspepsia/gastroparesis. Baylor College of Medicine/Texas Children's Hospital has been home since graduating fellowship and I've been fortunate to work with tremendous colleagues.

Outside of pediatric gastroenterology I am a lucky father of three children (ages 11, 9, and 7) and won the lottery with my spouse (her name is Corrie – a pediatric emergency medicine physician). Most of my time outside of the hospital is spent with the family. During the pandemic I've picked up some "great" habits like: watching Cobra Kai on Netflix; but have also enjoyed finding more time to play trumpet and sing (poorly) with my daughter Grace; throw the baseball and practice jiu-jitsu with my son Luke; and encourage my daughter Gabby to play softball and be a rock guitarist. Conrad R. Cole, MD, MPH, MSc

I am a Professor of Pediatrics at the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center (CCHMC), University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, Cincinnati, Ohio. I serve as the Medical Director of the Division of Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition and the Medical Director of the Intestinal Rehabilitation Program. In the realm of training, I am the fellowship director for the CCHMC advanced nutrition fellowship program. Within the hospital, I co-chair the clinical medical directors' group.

My family is from Sierra Leone and I graduated from the University of Ibadan, college of Medicine in Nigeria. I spent gap time in Trinidad and Tobago before engaging in a research fellowship in Pediatric Nutrition and Metabolism at Maimonides Medical Center, Brooklyn, New York. I completed my residency at Miami Children's Hospital, Miami, Florida and Pediatric GI fellowship at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center. During my fellowship training, I obtained a graduate degree in Public Health (MPH in Outcomes and Policy) from Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. My initial position post fellowship was at Emory University, where I obtained a CDC foundation award that allowed me to focus on Micronutrient malnutrition in children from low income populations. I was also awarded an NIH k-award to evaluate the epidemiology of central line associated blood stream infections in children with short bowel syndrome. During this time, I also enrolled and completed a Masters of Science in Clinical Research degree program. I returned to Cincinnati after 7 years and my clinical and research efforts continue to be centered on intestinal failure epidemiology and outcomes and micronutrient malnutrition in children.

I am actively involved in NASPGHAN and was the founding co-chair for the Intestinal rehabilitation special interest group (SIG) and now the chair of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion SIG. I am a past elected council member for gastroenterology of the Society for Pediatric Research. My interest in diversity and equity was the impetus for my organizing and hosting annually a networking dinner for minority peds GI fellows and faculty who attend NASPGHAN. I am also actively involved in a mentoring program in Cincinnati, 'Black Men in Medicine'.

I am married to Khadija and we have 2 children (Mandisa and Sekani) who keep me grounded. I love travelling and spend my spare time reading, running (Hiking) and travelling. When I travel, I usually try to visit the local children's hospital or children's ward as my global health interest is in program development.

Dr. Gold received his medical degree from The George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences, Washington, DC. He completed an internship and a residency in Pediatrics at Emory University School of Medicine, followed by a fellowship in Pediatric Gastroenterology at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, Canada, where he also completed his research fellowship at the Research Institute as a Medical Research Council of Canada Research Fellow.

Benjamin D. Gold, MD, joined Children's Center for Digestive Healthcare, LLC. GI Care for Kids, LLC. in 2009. Prior to joining CCDHC, Dr. Gold was the Marcus Chair of Pediatric Gastroenterology, a tenured Professor of Pediatrics and Professor of Microbiology as well as the Director of the Division of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition.

Dr. Gold has published over 160 peer-reviewed manuscripts, over 35 book chapters, and over 65 CME and CEU-accredited webinars, webcasts, and enduring digitized educational materials. He is been a sought-after lecturer on upper GI disease in children, as well as, is an international thought leader on pediatric esophageal disease (gastroesophageal reflux disease, GERD; eosinophilic esophagitis, EoE), *Helicobacter pylori* infection, as well as gut-microbial interactions leading to intestinal inflammation, allergy and immune-mediate disease, including pediatric inflammatory bowel disease (Crohn's and ulcerative colitis). Dr. Lightdale is board certified in Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition. Her scientific focus has been on improving the safety of procedural sedation for pediatric procedures, including gastrointestinal endoscopy. She has received NIH funding to investigate patient safety and pediatric sedation and has also received awards from the Risk Management Foundation and the American Society of Gastrointestinal Endoscopy for her work. Dr. Lightdale has served on and chaired many national committees, and lectures extensively. Currently, she is the Past-Chair of the executive committee of the Section on Gastroenterology Hepatology and Nutrition (SOGHN) of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and President-Elect of the North American Society of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (NASPGHAN). The focus of much of her work with both the AAP and NASPGHAN has been on identifying opportunities to educate and empower her pediatric colleagues to treat children with common gastrointestinal conditions.

Arvind Srinath, MD, MS

Dr. Arvind Srinath is an Associate Professor of Pediatrics, Associate Vice Chair for Education for Fellowship Training, and Pediatric Gastroenterology Fellowship Program Director at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. He received his Bachelors from Johns Hopkins University (2002), MD from University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine (2006), completed residency at Johns Hopkins Hospital (2009), and fellowship at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh (2012).

During fellowship, Dr. Srinath had the opportunity to pursue his interest in functional gastrointestinal symptoms through joining a psychiatrist and examining the effects of psychological and psychosocial functioning on gastrointestinal symptom perception in pediatric patients with IBD. His group's work helped highlight the importance of psychological symptoms in abdominal pain perception in pediatric patients with IBD, and how behavioral therapy affects physical health and overall healthcare utilization in those with this organic condition. He later was awarded a research fellowship grant from the Crohn's and Colitis Foundation of America to further understand the underpinnings of functional abdominal pain perception in pediatric patients with Crohn's disease. This grant helped support Dr. Srinath for the first two years as faculty at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. In 2014 while faculty, Dr. Srinath re-evaluated his mission, vision, and values, and namely realized that although he appreciated the incredible opportunities and learning from his research experience, his true passion was in medical education. He approached his division chief and conveyed these thoughts, namely with one goal of being fellowship program director. To optimize his ability in this potential educational role, Dr. Srinath requested and was approved to pursue his Masters of Science in Medical Education at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. Dr. Srinath completed his masters while faculty in December 2017 and during that time transitioned into his role as a clinical educator. While pursuing this degree, Dr. Srinath was promoted to co-direct the Pediatric Gastroenterology fellowship program in 2015, to direct the Pediatric Gastroenterology fellowship program in 2017, and then was additionally named the Associate Vice Chair for Education for Fellowship Training in 2018. Throughout this time Dr. Srinath's areas of interest have been in curricular development and fostering self-efficacy and metacognition in trainees.

Sofia Verstaete, MD

Dr. Sofia Verstraete is a gastroenterologist specializing in inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) — both ulcerative colitis and Crohn's disease — in children. She performs diagnostic and therapeutic procedures, including colonoscopies and other endoscopies, and cares for hospitalized patients as well as those visiting the clinic. Her special interests include IBD that develops at an early age, the ways in which rare conditions of chronic immunodeficiency relate to IBD, liver disease in patients with IBD and how to safely transition IBD patients to other providers' care.

Verstraete is a strong advocate for diversity. As a native Spanish speaker, she can evaluate treat patients who speak only Spanish, bringing particular value to medically complex cases where language and cultural barriers pose challenges. She is co-director of the UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital's Pediatric Inflammatory Bowel Disease Program and leads its clinical, research and quality improvement teams. She is passionate about improving remission rates among IBD patients at UCSF by offering a support group, hosting educational events, connecting patients with resources and creating subspecialty clinics to address the needs of patients who have other conditions along with IBD.

One focus of Verstraete's current research is how medical professionals classify IBD in pediatric patients. Her research also investigates how ethnicity impacts the condition's characteristics. In addition, she is active in clinical trials of cutting-edge medications for pediatric IBD.

After earning her medical degree from the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México, Verstraete completed a residency in pediatrics at the University of Miami Health System. She then completed a master of advanced studies degree in epidemiology and biostatistics as well as a fellowship in pediatric gastroenterology, hepatology and nutrition at UCSF.
